I love anniversaries of all kinds. St. Mark's 60th was certainly special. Frank and Shirley Roberson's 72nd comes to mind. Folks in recovery from addiction make a huge deal out annual anniversaries, though in some groups they're called birthdays. I even have an August anniversary of being the pastor of St. Mark for five years.

Often these milestones are marked with gifts. I want to tell you about several I've received in my time at St. Mark. One gift is surely the freedom to not have an answer to every challenge. That's noteworthy because you've granted me the freedom to fail as well as succeed. Sometimes it's called living in the solution instead of wallowing in the problem. In short, you've helped change my perspective. Part of that perspective is the understanding that St. Mark functions best as a team. Your pastors are part of the community, not lone wolves. As one of the most memorable advertisements in history says: "Thanks for your support." (Bartles & Jaymes if you're not familiar with the source.)

You've also extended the gift of forgiveness. Even though I try as hard as I can, I continually get things wrong on everything from announcements to administration, service to sermons. I'm also not particularly intuitive and you're always gentle in letting me know when some situation needs my attention. You know my flaws and cover them with forgiveness.

You've helped refine my theology as well. Through you I've come to better terms with the intersection of doubt and faith. Not necessarily polar opposites, doubt and faith serve a more defining role. God is not insulted by our questioning at all. In fact, I believe He's pleased we're even searching for answers that might somehow lead us to Him. God is still in the redemption business, after all.

My understanding of God's grace has definitely been shaped by St. Mark. I am inspired by the way you become the voice, hands, and feet of Jesus so consistently through worship, stewardship, mission, fellowship, and outreach. I've discovered new ways to know grace through your incredible generosity in

which you so freely share your gifts of time, energy, talents, and financial resources. You shower God's love everywhere you go.

I'm particularly appreciative of that last gift. You make me feel loved. You allow me to find acceptance in that love by letting me be me, regardless of my shortcomings.

Marriage of 72 Years Plus

No new records will be set with a number such as this, but it is bewildering to my wife and me. If the minister that married us had asked how long we would like our marriage to last, like any love-struck couple we would have replied "forever". We could not have dreamed that the forever would be 72 years and counting. We did not live together all 72 years. For 2 and 1/2 years the U S Navy allowed me a vacation in the unlovely country of New Guinea – 1943/1945.

The problem with multi-year marriages is life expectancy which at that time was 54 years for a male, 60 for a female - small in comparison to the number of years we have existed. Why the good Lord gave us the extra years is a mystery, as many other couples were more worthy. Some might say a combination of family genes, modest lifestyle, and good medical facilities were contributing factors. The mystery continues when one factors in marriage expectancy. It seems now there is about a 50% failure of marriages. Combining the two makes this seem unbelievable to us.

As a youth, I assumed an old person would have accumulated great wisdom. Now, as a super-senior person, I can say for certain this is not true. The same thing applies to senior married couples. If others are looking for a short and simple solution to long standing marital problems – there isn't, simply one day at a time. I do recall a helpful comment I heard: "being able to remember is interesting, being able to forget is mandatory."

Taking inventory after 72 years I find we are living in a lovely home, great neighborhood, and incredible church affiliations plus a daughter that is helpful and "Director of Transportation". Thank you Lord for all the material things as well as helping to allow our marriage to be ENDEARING and ENDURING. I guess we could say my CUP RUNNETH OVER, surely goodness and mercy shall follow us all the days of our lives, and we shall dwell in our house forever.


- Continue to grow in faith

Operating & Mission Funds

12 Months Through June 30, 2013



Treasurer's Report for the twelve months ending 6/30/13

- ⇒ Operating Fund revenue was \$4,600 more than expenditures, which was about \$1,400 below the budgeted surplus.
- ⇒ <u>Capital and Facilities Fund</u> revenue was about \$7,000 less than expenditures, which was about \$3,000 below budgeted deficit, due mainly to the Austin Hall A/C replacement project and repairs.
- ⇒ <u>Mission and Outreach Fund</u> revenue was about \$200 more than expenditures, which was about \$900 better than budget.

I just got back from my regular trip to Tennessee. Most summers I go to teach in a program for people studying to be pastors. It probably won't surprise you that I teach the Christian Education courses in the program. They have the creative titles of "Christian Education I" and "Christian Education II". We have classes for five days. Then the students have quite a bit of reading that they have to do on their own along with written assignments. We wrap up with a conversation with me about Christian education for their final assignment.

I always enjoy my time teaching.

The students in CE II have a pretty good idea of what to expect when we start the course since they have already completed CE I.

But for the students in CE I it is a whole new adventure. Most do not know what to expect. They have never had me as a teacher. Some are brand new to the program. So they arrive at class a bit anxious. Many of them have never given any serious thought to the questions like "What is Christian Education?" and "What's the purpose of education in the church?" But that won't be true at the end of our five days together. They will have begun to think about the

questions. They also will have begun to formulate some answers to them.

Some of the students will embrace the adventure. They will participate in class. They will do the assignments. We will have a great conversation about Christian education. And I will see them in CE II one summer.

Other students will reject the adventure. They don't do the assignments. I don't get the privilege of being with them in CE II.

I'm still thinking about our celebration of St Mark's 60th anniversary earlier this summer. I have looked at the picture of people gathered in the 1st building that housed St. Mark in the very early days. What an adventure that must have been. I suspect that there were some people who weren't ready for such and experience and wandered off to more established congregations. But I'm glad that there were people who embraced the adventure of starting a new church out in the middle of the fields of far eastern Dallas.

I'm wondering what sort of adventures may be in store for us in the coming years and decades. What might God be calling us to do? And I wonder if we will embrace the challenge of the adventure. What do you think?
